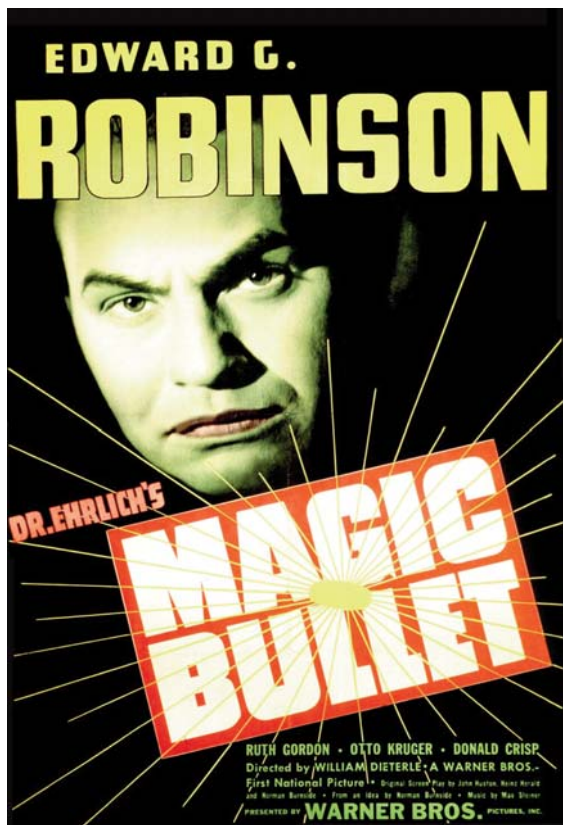


History of Medicine: Paul Ehrlich and tuberculosis

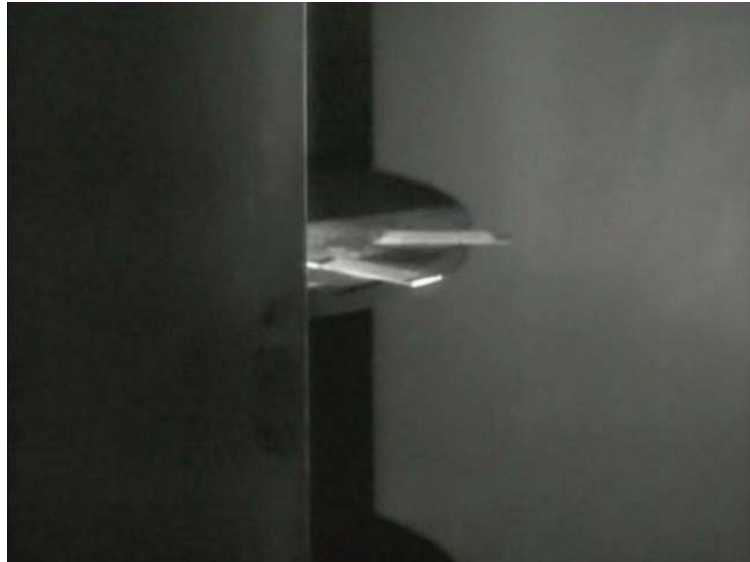
Ehrlich attends the conference where Dr Robert Koch reports the discovery of the aetiology of tuberculosis.



He tells Koch that he can develop a good way of staining his bacillus and Koch provides him with a culture.



Some time later, at home, coughing and freezing with the cold he attempts to stain the bacillus.



Through his wife's carelessness on turning on a stove on which there were some preparations, he manages to stain Koch's bacillus (fiction)...



... proving its acid resistance.



He shows his discovery to Koch, who in his excitement offers him a job.



During the celebration, while dancing with his wife he faints. He suffers from pulmonary tuberculosis caused by his work with the bacillus.



Ehrlich and his wife travel to Egypt so that he can recover from tuberculosis with the help of the climate, rest and healthy eating habits.



The film does not include Ehrlich's work with tuberculin, entrusted to him by Koch, but it does include his discovery of the magic bullet.

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
